

The "Welcome Mat" is ready and just waiting to be rolled out when our Association members set foot on Ireland's soil this coming June and July.

After years of dreaming, thinking and planning, our O Dochartaigh Family Reunion at Derry brings the cumulation of a dream shared by all of us. It is our hope that each one of you attending will experience a thrill of a lifetime and come home ever so richer because you have shared a part of your inheritance.

We would especially like to receive your comments and experiences that we might incorporate them in future newsletters. I know that many of you will not be traveling with us to the Reunion, but rest assured you certainly will be with us in spirit, and we'll be thinking of you.

Perhaps some of you will afford yourselves the opportunity to do a bit of root searching while in Ireland. Good luck! I cannot stress the importance of researching as much as you can at home first.

The Territorial Divisions of Ireland are as follows:

TOWNLAND: A very ancient unit and varies considerably in size; the smallest is under an acre and the largest runs into thousands of acres. The size is generally in inverse relation to the quality of the land. Small means good land and large means bad land.

PARISH: Eccleiastical in origin, is made up of a number of Townlands. Parishes were based on the monasteries until the 12-13th centuries, when, under the influence of the Normans, the system was changed to diocesan. The administrative Parish, called the civil parish takes its name sometime from the Townland in which the church is situated, although some may take the name of the Church patron Saint. In the year 1901 there were 2,428 parishes in Ireland, rainging from land measuring 2 acres to 200,960 acres.

BARONY: A number of Parishes makes up a Barony. The name "Barony" is feudal in origin and military in purpose. The Barony was to supply its lord or Baron with a fixed number of men and supplies for the King's service. In the Gaelic system too, the clan territory was expected to provide a certain number of warriors and tribute the King's hosting.

<u>COUNTY</u>: Of all the territorial divisions, the County is the most modern. English settlers introduced the "shire" system from England. Twelve Counties date from the 13th century: Dublin, Kildare, Meath, Louth, Carlow, Kilkenny, Wexford, Waterford, Cork, Kerry, Limerick and Tipperary. These were the most fertile lands.

KINGDOMS: There were five principal Kingdoms in Ireland before the Norman invasion; Ulster, Munster, Leinster, Meath and Connaught. The Kingdom of Meath, with its capital at Tara was merged with Leinster and these old kingdoms now constitute the four Provinces of Ireland.

Everyone talks about castles, cathedrals and churches but rarely do we ever read or hear about the silent rock sentinels found on the seacoasts of Ireland. The Martello Towers were usually built on ledges above rocky beaches. They were almost egg in shape, with the narrow end pointing out to see, to show less face to the enemy. The stones varied in size, some being at least 5 ft. long. The walls themselves measured 8 ft. thick. The entrance passage was at least 10 ft. from the ground. Access was by ropes or ladders. The apertures were very steeply sloped and they were traversed by a round iron bar to facilitate the hauling up of material and provisions. Generally the towers consisted of three chambers; ammunition and provisions stored on the ground floor, the central chamber for living quarters. The third contained a parapet containing the cannon on a pivot. The Martello Towers on the east coast were built in the early 19th century for protection. feared by the invasion of Napoleon. * * *

A significant part of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge is the Medalof Honor Grove set aside to honor the men serving in the uniform of their country who received our country's highest award for valor in actions assuring the security of our nation and its continued freedom.

His citation reads: "At the head of a detachment of his company dashed across an open field, exposed to a deadly fire from the enemy, and succeeded in dislodging them from an unoccupied house, which he and his comrades defended for several hours against repeated attacks, thus preventing the enemy from flanking the position of the Union

forces and imprisoned at Andersonville for 23 months. Each day of his imprisonment he wrote in his diary. At the conclusion of the war, Michael was on his way home with 1500 of his comrades on board a riverboat called the Sultana, when the boiler exploded, splitting the boat in two and dumping all aboard into the Mississippi River.

In the days when Irish Chieftains were independent rulers, each one had his own bodyguard of retainers or servants. The latter were generally athletes, and friendly games and contests frequently took place between rival clans. A story is told, that on one occasion the contest finished "all even" between the O'Doherty and O'Donnell teams. There was then held a final deciding test between a giant representing each side in a weight-lifting competition. The O'Donnell failed to lift a stone given him for the test. The O'Doherty then came forward and, amidst cries of encouragement from his supporters, succeeded in lifting the stone. The O'Dohertys, amidst loud cheering, were declared the winners, but their jubilation presently gave way to grief and "keening" as their champion was heard to say "Breash-ma-chree" (it has broken my heart) and immediately expired. The scene of this incident is shown to be near Castle Aileach, Derry, Northern Ireland.

Family Group #20 is known, in Donegal, as the Corn-lena Doherty's. They are so called because the grandfather is Cornelis and from Lenan Bay. Thus, when speaking about Doherty's and designating a sept. as the Corn-lena's everyone knows their origin.

A grandparent of one of our members confided to the wide-eyed grandchild that he was indeed fortunate to be on this earth. According to Grandpa O'Dochartaigh, the village that this sept came from in Donegal, had fought the enemy bitterly and brutally, causing the enemy to retreat from the village. The village was inhabited by O'Dochartaigh's. When the enemy had regrouped and reinforced themselves they made a massive raid on the village of O'Dochartaigh's, vowing to kill every male inhabitant, regardless of their age. They came and slaughtered the male O'Dochartaigh's; old men and little boys, as well as the O'Dochartaigh warriors. Through all the bloodshed a wife of one of those slain, by the enemy, quietly gave birth to a son, under the cover of her long skirts, while rocking gently in a chair. Grandpa O'Dochartaigh was emphatic in his declaration that we are all descended from that one lady, in Donegal.

This same grandpa was known to the lumbering community of Michigan, in the late 1900's, as "Bulldog Tom Dougherty roughest man between Detroit and the Straits of Mackinac." To his grandchildren he was quite a gentle person, with hands as big as hams, often heard to refer to babies as "little gaffers." We can only wish that we could have heard more of his stories, as I am sure they were many, in number and would have enriched our lives. (Family Group #1)

Foderal Judge John Sprizzo has denied a British request for the extradition of former Irish Republican Army volunteer Joseph Doherty under the political offense exemption to America's extradition treaty with Britian.

Following his escape, the sentence of life imprisonment was pronounced against him in his absence.

Judge Sprizzo ruled that the political offense exemption was valid in this case and that the Irish Republican Army's struggle is to wrest political control of Ireland from Britain.

A Question of Race

A dozen years ago, I was a graduate student and administrator at the University of Notre Dame, a school that has educated more than it's share of O'Dochartaighs. Ethnic humor was rife among my computer-employees, very few of whom were of Gaelic descent. "Bernie" Nalepinski was accused of heading a plot to install a "Polack-Pope", and "Bernie" Goldberg of a plot to replace President Hesburg with the former Jewish Lord-Mayor of Dublin.

But I was the butt of my share. Close Hispanic friends called me "Anglo", knowing full well the Celtic-Gaelic nature of the O'Dochartaigh gene pool-not a drop of Angle, Saxon, Jute nor Dane blood in it. And how were they so sure? By our last name, "which is certainly not found in Hispanic countries." They knew full well that when the O'Donnells fled Donegal in 1607, in the "Flight of the Earls", they were accompanied by at least one male O'Doherty. To have pointed out that I had an engineering naval officer counterpart in the Spanish Navy, Admiral Pascual Do(g)herty, of ancient lineage, would have been to play into their hands. They would have succeeded in "getting a rise out of (me)", something one dare not let happen at Notre Dame and still be allowed to take part in this good-natured ethnic ribaldry.

But how do we defend, if such were ever "required", the <u>black</u> O'Dochartaighs?

Not all blacks have emigrated against their will, but most, by far, did,
and it is their right to our name that is to be justified here.

In America, the first slaves arrived only a few decades after the landing of the Pilgrims, and black men formed a (very) small part of the Spanish Occupation here in the Southwest, between Santa Fe, N.M. and Mexico City, beginning a hundred years earlier. But, with admittedly limited research resources, I can find no record of black O'Dochartaighs among either group. It therefore follows that they earned their right to the name in the country where they now reside.

Now there are records of O'Dochartaigh plantation and slave-owners in America. We must assume that some fathered children of slave-mothers, as was quite common during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries in America. Such children may or may not have been acknowledged at birth, and some might never have been had not the 14th Amendment intervened, for a black man, in order to vote, was required to state his family name.

He took it from one of three sources, and stated it in one of two ways, it seems:

- If fathered by his owner, he used his owner's last name, and quite properly so. Or,
- 2) otherwise used his owner's last name, with or without the latter's permission, or
- 3) used, most often with their permission, the name of some family that had been kind to him. A black cowboy, George McJunkin, who made a famous anthropological find in New Mexico seventy years ago, did just that.

If illiterate, he had his name spelled <u>phonetically</u>-some verbal variation of "Do(u)gherty". Once reduced to writing, that spelling "stuck".

Do black O'Dochartaighs have a right to take part in our family activities?

Your Tribal Seanachie here maintains they do, without question, and with great

welcome.

Unfortunately, the process of restoring full justice to the black man, who, like our ancestors in Ireland, has suffered gross, severe, and incalculable prejudice for being what he is, or his ancestors were, forbidden to achieve his full potential, is incomplete. It will be a long time before he can, without embarrassment, take part in any form of that good-natured Notre Dame ethnic repartee. Let us hope that will take no longer than absolutely necessary, and let us, at least in our own family, hasten the day.



OUR SPANISH CONNECTION

HEADQUARTERS is in possession of many publications on Ship Hydro-dynamics and Energy Saving Ship Construction. These are authored by Pascual O'Dogherty, Admiral. One book is co-authored by M. O'Dogherty. These books detail such information as: Propeller, Hull Interaction and Propulsive Efficiency and related problems, Hydrodynamic optimization of an energy saving trawler.

A group of our members met with Pascual for an eventful evening during one of Pascual's world circling lecture tours. He was conducting a symposium on "Ship Hydrodynamics" at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

Pascual with his family will be very much in evidence at the Irish Reunion. He was born in 1920. Feel free to introduce yourself to this very charming Irish-Spanish gentlemen and his equally charming family.

REMARKS

- (1) The original Gaelic name is HY-DAHER-TEAGH, meaning "The Lord of the oak houses".
- (2) Cathaoir Rua (Sir Cahir, for the English) was the last of the Irish Chieftains, being well-known in Irish History for his revolt in 1608, when he burned Derry to the ground, in order to; revenge an insult to himself, by the English Governor. His sword is kept as a War trophy, at the Guild Hall, in Derry. At the death of Cathaoir Rus, beheaded by a Scottish marksman, in Kilmacrennan, the O'Dogherty line continued through his two brothers, Sean the eldest, who escaped from Inis Eoghain, to find refuge with his foster father, The O'Rourke, in Co. Cavan, and Rory, the youngest, who went to the Spanish Netherlands, at the side of his sister Rose, married to The O'Neill, who was serving in the Spanish Army of the Archduke. Rory served in that Army, leaving no known descendance. Sean married in Derry in 1609, to Elizabeth O'Cahan. His descendants lived generally in Co. Cavan, where they had an extense estate.
- (3) At the death of Eoghan O'D, in 1784, his younger brother, Henry, who was Vicar General of the Diocese of Meath, decided to bring his nephews, HENRY, SEAN and CLINTON-DILLON O'D (sons of EOGHAN)

The O'DOGHERTY Clan is a junior branch of the O'DONNELL family, as FIAMHAN, ancestor of DOCHARTACH, was a younger brother of MURCHADH. The O'DONNELL. Just in the same way, all the McDAIDS are originated from DAVID O'DOGHERTY, second brother of one of the ruling O'DOGHERTY Chieftains.

The proper spelling of the name is O DOCHARTAIGH, meaning descendants of DOCHARTACH.

SOME NOTES ON THE GENEALOGY OF THE O'DOGHERTY FAMILY

According to the books IRISH PEDIGREES", by O'Hart (Vol. I & II) and "TWIXT FOYLE AND SWILLY", by Harry P. Swan, the O'Doghertys descend directly from King HEBER FIONA of Ireland, son of King MILESIUS of Spain, through King NIAL OF THE NINE HOSTAGES and his son CONAL GULBAN. The O'Dogherty Clan is called Clann Fiamhain.

FIAMHAN, direct ancestor of DOCHARTACH, founder of the name, was the 12th direct descendant of King Nial.

- 26 Sir Cahir O'Dogherty: First son of John Og, Lord of Inis Eoghain. Died in 1608, at 21 years of age, leaving no male issue.

 John O'Dogherty (1588-1638), second brother of Cahir. He married in Derry in 1609 to Elizabeth, eldest daughter of Patrick O'Cahan. At the death of Sir Cahir. O'Dogherty, slain by a marksman in Kilmacrenan, John was hidden by his foster father, The O'Rourke. A third brother of Sir Cahir, Rory, escaped to the Spanish Netherlands and served with the Catholic Armies of the Archduke. Rory left no known descendance.
- 127 John O'Dogherty, first son of John, had no male descendance. Owen O'Dogherty, second son, who married to Mary O'Rourke in 1638. William O'Dogherty, third brother.
- 128. Cahir O'Dogherty (1639-1714), first son of Owen. He was three years old at the death of his father in 1642. He married Bridget O'Reilly in 1667, in Co. Cavan. He had a second brother, called Owen.
- 129 Owen O'Dogherty, second son of Cahir, who died in 1732. He married in 1715 to Margaret O'Cassidy, daughter of Henry O'Cassidy, Esq., Co Louth. He had a first brother, Cahir, who left no descendance.
- 130 John O'Dogherty, first son of Owen, died in 1762. He married to Margaret O'Kelly in Co. Cavan. He had a second brother, called Cahir.
- Owen O'Dogherty, first son of John, who died in 1784, leaving three sons, who were minor of age at the death of their father. He married Jane Browne. He had a second brother, Henry, who had graduated in Sciences at the Sorbonne, in Paris University. He became a priest and was also a D.D. and Vicar General of the Diocese of Meath. In 1790, Henry O'Dogherty decided to accompany his three nephews, Henry, John and Clinton-Dillon O'Dogherty, to Spain, hoping for them to make a career in the Spanish Navy.
- Henry (1774-1803), John (1775-1847) and Clinton Dillon (1777-1805) O'Dogherty, sons of Owen. They traveled to Spain in 1790, with their uncle Henry, joining the Spanish Navy, as midshipmen. For this purpose, they had to bring along their Genealogy, showing their lineal descendance from John Og O'Dogherty, Lord of Inis Eoghain from 1582 to 1601. Henry and Clinton-Dillon died without descendance. John O'Dogherty married in 1808 to María Josefa Macedo, in Redondela (Galicia, Spain).
- 133 Juan O'Dogherty (1809-18407), first son of John . Army Officer. He married María Navaja in Redondela. Carlos Enrique O'Dogherty , second brother, who died in his youth.

- Ramón Salvador O'Dogherty (1835-1902), first son of Juan. Born in Redondela. Traveled to England, in his middle twenties, in order to claim Irish family proporty. His lineage was certified by the Queen's Bench, but not the land proporty which had prescribed, due to the long time elapsed. Back to Spain, he settled down in San Fernando (Cádiz) and married in 1883 to Isabel Sánchez.
- 135 Pascual O'Dogherty (1886-1964), only legitimate son of Ramón Salvador. Born in San Fernando (Cádiz). Married in 1918 to Cayetana Sánchez-Zuazo. He was a well known Headmaster of a School of Mathematics, in San Fernando. At his death, a street has been dedicated to his memory.
- 136 Ramón Salvador O'Dogherty, first son of Pascual. Born in San Fernando (Cádiz), in 1919. Doctor in Medicine, specialist in Pathology. Married in 1952 to Catalina Fabra. He has two brothers, Pascual O'Dogherty II, (1920-), Rear Admiral in the Spanish Navy, Director of Canal de Experiencias Hidrodinámicas, El Pardo, Madrid and Angel O'Dogherty (1926-) Doctor in History, Director of the Mexican Institute of Spanish Culture and Cultural Attaché to the Spanish Embassy in Mexico City.
- Ramón Salvador O'Dogherty Jr. (1960-), only son of Ramón Salvador O'Dogherty, student of Law. Pascual O'Dogherty III (1951-), Doctor of Medicine, Manuel O'Dogherty (1953-), graduate in Computer Sciences, John O'Dogherty (1955-), doctor of Medicine and post-graduate student in Rome, Miguel O'Dogherty (1957-), graduate in Economics, and Ignacio O'Dogherty (1963-), student, all sons of Pascual O'Dogherty II. Pascual O'Dogherty (1957-), graduate in Economics, Angel O'Dogherty Jr. (1958-), graduate in Economics and Gerardo O'Dogherty (1964-), student, sons of Angel O'Dogherty.





As mentioned elsewhere, we found in Sampson County, North Carolina a ceritable colony of Daughtrys who continue living there on lands granted to their ancestors over two hundred years ago.

Revoluntionary War records reveal the fact that a number of Daughtrys (and variant spellings) served as valiant soldiers and patroits in the war for independence of their new country, America.

It appears highly probable that at least some of them came from Sampson and Duplin Counties, North Carolina; and we know they settled in this area; some on the Ogeechee River and its tributaries, and some on the Fifteen Mile Creek. Some of these lands, granted under Headright and Bounty laws, and later, land "won" in the Georgia land lotteries, are to this day in possession of and being farmed by descendants of our Daughtry pioneers. We find the first records of our Daughtry ancestors in Effingham, Screven, Bulloch and Emanuel Counties, Georgia, beginning ca. 1791.

In this connection, tradition has it that one John Daughtry received an English Crown grant of over 2000 acres in the vicinity of Fifteen Mile Creek in present Candler County. An exhaustive search of Georgia's original land grant records by the Surveyor General Department, Georgia Department of Archives and Hisjtory, failed to locate any such grant to John Daughtry (or variant spellings). This search was made in 1981.

Doherty Stove Works

Thomas son of James and Alice Garrett Doherty was born in Perth in Lanark County of Ontario in 1843. He came with his parents to Uttonexter in Lambton County where they farmed for several years. They named the Post Office Uttonexter after their home in England in the year 1866. He opened a machine shop in Watford where he and his sons built first threshing machine and made drum sticks. In 1877 Thomas was farming Con 8 lot 24 Plympton Two. Lambton County. In 1882 he moved to Sarnia and opened a stove works and began manufacturing stoves. Mr. Thomas Montgomery who had been employed by Goddison Thresher Co. joined Thomas and built the first car in Sarnia. It was wound up like a clock and had to be rewound each time it ran down. Later they built what is believed to be the first gasoline operated car in Canada. A young man named Henry Ford came to Sarnia to examine their creation. In 1897, Mr. Montgomery left Doherty's and joined Imperial Oil Co. Mr. Doherty developed a method for making carbon steel and went to England and sold the patent there. The stove works continued till it closed in 1946.

Thomas married Elizabeth Brownand they had the following children James, Ada, Grace, John, William Lorne, Alice Elizabeth, Jenny and Phoebe. Thomas died Sept. 6, 1916 at Sarnia at age 73.

DAUGHARTY

William Daugharty was born in Ross Grey County, Tipperary Ireland. When he was 18 years old he went to England and learned the trade of shoemaker. He enlisted in the British Army and fought under Lord Nelson in the Battle of Trafalgar (Oct. 21, 1805). He emigrated to Canada at the expiration of his term of service, locating in Montreal and engaged in the boot and shoe business. He later moved to the Township of Osnabruck, County of Stormont in Ontario Canada where he settled on land granted by the British Government by virtue of his service in the Army. He died by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of a friend. William married Hannah McNeil of McNeils Ferry, Vermont, U.S.A. and had a son James born in 1785 and died March 19. 1872.

James J. Daugharty was born April 10, 1785 (?) in Montreal, Quebec and married Catharina Empy on February 25, 1812 at Osnabruck Twp., Stormont County. James engaged in farming, lumbering and milling. He served in Ridge's Light Brigade during the war of 1812 and spent the last years of his live with his son Gordon Alexander Daugharty. James and Catherina had 18 children of which seven reached maturity. They are: Catherine Eliza b. Oct. 9, 1812; James William b. Aug. 1, 1814; Edwin J. B. ?; Johiohl b. Oct. 23, 1826; Gordon Alexander b. June 5, 1830; Diana b. c 1834; Pembrook b. Feb. 19,1833. Gordon Alexander or Alexander Gordon Daughary was educated at Madison University, N. Y. graduating with degree of A.B. with class of 1857, and in 1859 took degree of A. M. at the same University. The same year he was ordained to the ministry (Baptist) of Ogdensburg, N. Y. and for about seventeen years was in active ministerial work. Fourteen years of this time being spent in Canada, six years at Leamington, Ontario. Since he retired in 1876 he has preached on several occasions. Gordon A. married Emma Jane Spencer of County Huntington, on September 3, 1861 at Fort Covington, N. Y. They were the parents of five children.


Outline of the generations from Edward and Sarah Smith Dougherty











THE O'DOUGHTERY'S "VIGOR, OUR HERITAGE"

The personification of the family coat of arms. "Vigor our Heritage", lives in the song and story in County Bonegal, Ireland, from where the O'Dougherty clan migrated to America. The desendants of the Dougherty's stand 15th in the list of the commonest surnames in Ireland.

In early 1800's, the O'Dougherty clan came to America. Some of the family stayed in Boston, Hass.; while the more adverturous ones came by way of New Orleans, up the Hississippi River to Lycurgus, Ibra, to an established Irish settlement known as French Creek.

James J. Dougherty was born October 13, 1857, here: His father had dropped the '0', being know then as plain' Dougherty.

It was here James I. Dougherty received his early education. He was an excellent student and through out his life time he was an avid leader. He was gifted with a photographic mind. He enrolled in Valpariso University, Indiana, where he received a teacher's certificate. Perhaps it was here he developed his talent for expressing himself colonfully and most intelligently on the politics of the day - which enjoyment he never lost in his lifetime.

Margaret Kelleher was born in Allamakee county, Iowa, October 13, 1859, where she grew to womanhood. July 19, 1881, she married James J. Dougherty and the joiltowing year July 27, 1882, they moved to Park River, North Takota. That year J. J. Dougherty became the first school teacher in Larimore, North Dakota. He traveled by horse-Yack receiving \$35.00 a month as his salary— a small wage to keep ap wife and home.

In 1883, they moved to Grand Forks, North Pakota, where James J. Dougherty worked for Stephen Collins who was in the coal and lumber business. The following year, he came back to Park River, North Pakota, where he was associated with McEwars and Dougherty Company (partners) - a farm implement business serving Park River, Conway, Edinburg, and Wilton, North Pakota.

In 1907, he organized the N. W. Hackinery Company and the HcEwan-Dougherty West Line of Elevators in Saskatchewan, Canada.

J. J. Dougherty was known as a real estate tycoon. It was said that you could wath west of Park River to Rugby, North Dakota, and not put foot on any land that wasn't Jim Dougherty's.

He acquired large holdings in the Saift Current, Canada area; including clevators and a large general stone. This enterprize was destroyed by fire at a loss of a half million dollars. His land in Kansas never brought in an oil well on two in his life time - another disappointment of J. J.

J. J. Pougherty was on of four to organize the Implement Dealers Mutual Fire Insurance Company where he served as director for 20 years.

with the Democratic Party. In 1897 to 1899, he served in the State Legislature

'for two terms — a real exciting and wheeling and dealing period in the State. This was a highlight in his life. He was elected as Mayor of Park River for fown terms. He served on the school board for several years. He was appointed Post - Master of Park River by President Wilson, serving eight years.

He provided his family with much of the worldly goods such as a racing horse named Florence, ponies for his children's enjoyment, pets, dancing, painting, and music lessons, traveling, higher education, and fast cars. He was a stern disapplinarian - his motto: "Spare the rod, spoil the child".

Their beautifully appointed home sow many happy times. This home, in the name of progress, was torn down in 1975 to be replaced by the Netropolitan Savings and Loan Building. This writer experienced a very heavy heart seeing that house demolished.

Through J. J. Pougherty's help and assistance, Wrs. Dougherty's relatives - the Kennys, O'Briens and Kellehers - were brought to Park River in 1902 from lowa. They too established themselves in the Park River vicinity - raised their families and became respected useful citizens.

The obituary of Hrs. James J. Dougherty (Hargaret Kelleher) reads - "In the

death of Whs. Dougherty, Park River has lost a good and useful cilizen who was universally loved". We wholeheartedly agree that in the death of this beautiful pioneer - a well known and highly respected lady - the community had indeed lost a valuable ditizen.

Her talents were varied. She was a fastidious home-maker and a lover of all things beautiful. Her hand painted china and oils are cherished possesions in our home. Her needlewonk was another of her excellent accomplishments. What an apple she could bake! It was a work of art as well as delectable.

Socially, she was a leader. She was an early bridge enthusiast and usually there was a bridge game going daily. She cherished her charter membership in the American Legion Auxiliary, whose eligibility she gained through her youngest son Walter's war record. She was faithful in her activities in her clunch, which brought her much joy and comfort.

"Iour sons and one daughter were broughtirto this union: John, Emmett, Florence, Harold and Walter. John neceived his early education in Park River, attended Georgetown University, at Washington, D.C., where he articulated in law. He held the world's record in sprinting. This record is posted in the halls of Georgetown University. From here he attended the University of Winnesota. He married Julie Grace of Grafton; a social event, and they left immediatelyfollowing their marriage for Swift Current, Canada, in 1909, to run the J. J. Dougherty business there.

Two childnen - Manganet (Mrs. Fening) of Moneticelli, Iowa, and T. E. Dougherly, Waterloo, Towa, were bonn in Swift Current. A son Jim, bonn in Waterloo, Towa, died at seven years of age and is burled in Waterloo. John and Julia are also buried there. There are six grandchildnen and seven great grandchildnen in this family.

Emmett, a graduate of Parh River High School, attended Notre Dame at South Bead, Indiana. He, too, studied law, but never practiced it 'per se'. His career was in business. He married Esther Weiss of Chicago, Illinois. One son, James Ermett, Jr., was born, to this union. Both James Ermet, Sr.. and James Ermett, Jr. are buried in-

Chicagor James Ermett, In. Lebt one son, James Ermett the 111 sho Lives in Chicago. He has one son, James Ermett the IV, Living in Chicago. Ester Weiss Dougherty Lives in Chicago Heights, Illinois, enjoying her grandchild and great grandchild.

'] Espaence Dougherty, after finishing high school in Park River, enrolled at St. Katherines in Minneapolis. She spent one year here, transferring to the North Dakota University where she received a teacher's certificate. Her teaching career was short lived for soop'she married Clement O'Brien (Pat) who was a cashier in Farmers Security Bank of Park River. Five childnen were born to this union: Jean (Mrs. Jack Strouts) of Fort Wayne, Indiana; Walter of Alaska (now deceased); Pat of Minneapolis, who married Lydia larson of Park River (daughter of lars larson); Naney (Mrs. Jim Balcom) and Mary Ann, who married lee Johnson of Chroll, Jows, were born in Winneapolis, where Clement O'Brien had been transferred to the First Bank Conporation of Minneapolis. Later he owned and operated a hardware stone in South Minneapolis. There pre twenty-six grandchildren to brighten this union.

Both Clement and Florence, his wife, are buried in the Dougherty plot in the Calvary-Cemetary of Park River.

Hanold received his early education in Park River. He attended a business college in Grand Forks, coming back after his graduation to work in the Park River Roller Will as bookeeper. He worked here until it was destroyed by fine. From here he worked as bookeeper in the Williston Roller Will for many years. This too was destroyed by fire. He returned to Park River with his wife and family, worked for the Standard Oil Company until his retirement, and lived in the J. J. Dougherty residence until Habel and Hanold's death. He served as mayor of Park River, Like his father, the standard bill laxed of branchier. They had three children: Dan, Betty and Donna. Four grandchildren blessed this happy union. Betty chose a career in the Wilitary, receiving many honors and promotions. Donna [Whs. Burney Cook] Lives in Minneapolis. She is happily employed by the Girl Scouts. Dan has made a successful career for himself with Tenith Coxponation, as vice president. He and his wife Donna Live in Northfield, Illinois, with three of
