- 11th. Day-17th. July --- Our final day-An afternoon and evening programme: We will spend a short time in the early P.M. attending to a business meeting. There are many topics to discuss. Do be present to air your thoughts on continuing the association. The outgoing officers will also be closing up another 5 yr. run. Then you will witness the passing of "The White Rod of Office, depicting the Chieftainship of "The " O'Dochartaigh ". Be with us when we take our rightful role beside other great clans of Ulster. A Medieval Banquet will follow, giving you the opportunity to meet the Clann Chieftain. This festive day will end with a ceremonial Ball. It is hoped all will be in attendance to make this day a great day.

This is the programme. There are details to be filled in as work continues. There certainly is the probability of alterations in the above written schedule. We are so pleased to hear many are coming early. We can use help.

As you have noticed, there are tours all over the place. Cars are expensive, insurance worse. We are arranging buses for the tours. If the demand is there, we will have buses at airports. In the B and B section, we mentioned pick-up points. If enough people do not have cars, the householder will take you to the pick-up point by a certain time for the daily tour. There will be an extra charge for this short trip, (negotiable).

How are we financing all our activities? Pre-planning costs, committee costs, reunion costs will be covered by those taking part in the many programmes. For those coming in from the U. S. A. we are assessing a reunion fee, payable to Inch Island Headquarters. If you don't come by C.D.I. we collect fees at the program. Headquarters can not go in the red from reunion costs. It went thousands of \$\$'s in the red from the last one. We are trying to cover all expensis by assessing a fee to those attending. As you can tell, we could easily go broke, (and even bonkers), by all the links not fitting together.

The last reunion we had several problems. One was a carrier that took our members all over Ireland, with a short stay here. We are running this gathering but 11 days, hoping you will spent an exciting but relaxed time in Derry and Donegal. Do the tour of Ireland some other time. These committees believe they have a program for your satisfaction. Learn all about the land of your origin. Meet as many of your relatives as you can.

We'll I had better explain: The O'Docartaig, (you and me), are the second family in all of Europe to gain a surname. The other, O'Cleary, (1st), (meaning; Clerk), were so named in 899. We were named in 981, long before surnames were common in other parts of the world. We are called a Junior Sept to the O'Donnells though the first record of their name was in 954 A.D. But we are Junior, due to the fact the O'Donnells are descended from an older brother.

This makes it a little more than a millinium, (1000 yrs.), since we were christened " The Destroyers". This research is from Dr. John J. Dougherty of Prescott, Az.

During the Penal Days, the British caused many Irish names to be anglized. If your name was McGowan, meaning Smith, it often was changed to that name, Glasheen, became Green, etc. BUT they did not wish an Irish family running around calling themselves, " The Destroyers". So we caught the other British technique; we had to drop the 'O'. The 'O' belongs there and many are taking it back. If you had an Mc, (son of), before your name, you were forced to drop that. The O means, grandson of. AND we are all the grandson of a Dochartaigh.

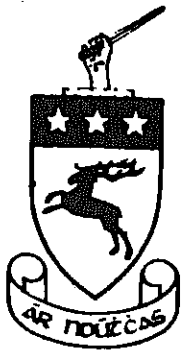

O'DOCHARTAIGH was the original of the name in the Irish language derived from the word DOCHARTAIGH meaning destroyer.

The name varies from O'Dochartaig' to O'Doherty, Doherty, Dougherty, Daugherty, Docherty, etc.

The O'Dochartaigh clan held their territories for centuries in the Inishowen Peninsula in County Donegal.

The are descended from the powerful King, King of the Nine Hostages.

After the plantation of Ulster, many O'Dochartaighs emigrated to Scotland and England and later to Australia and North America where many settled and prospered.

The O'Dochartaigh Family Research Association holds its International Re-Unions every five years, the first two being held in Michigan and Ohio, and the last in 1985 was held in Derry City and Donegal, where our clann originated. This year a number of delegations from overseas have made contact with our clann's world headquarters, 'Ar Duthchas', on Inch Island, and today, Mr. Brian Dougherty, an executive of General Motors, Detroit, and his son Paul whose fifth birthday occurs today, will meet Councillor Tony Carlin, the Mayor of Derry, both of whom have been selected by the Mid-West contingent of the clann who are currently in Ireland. Professor Pat Dougherty, our Clann Herald, who has resided at our World H.Q. since the summer of 1985, and Mr. Fionnbarra O'Dochartaigh, our North of Ireland representative, form part of to-day's delegation which will communicate to the city's Mayor a progress report on activities associated with the next Re-Union of the Clann in July 1990.

At the request of the Clann the Mayor of Derry may display the sword of Sir Cahir Rua O'Dochartaigh, the last of the Celtic chieftains to rise in rebellion against the English, one year after the Flight of the Earls in 1608. The rebellion witnessed the burning of Derry, battles in Tyrone, County Derry and Donegal, and the ultimate defeat of the Clann at Kilscreannan in the latter country. Sir Cahir, then aged 21 years, was captured, beheaded, and quartered, his head eventually being placed on a pike for public view at Dublin Castle, the administrative centre of British rule in Ireland.

Are we Clann Fiamhain or are we Clann O'Dochartaigh? In the strictest since of protocol, we are Clann "Fiamhain". The emerging clann is named from the Grandfather of the first to use the descriptive name. In our case, Fiamhain, (various spellings), was the grandfather of 'Docartaig', who apparently, was hurtfull, or a destroyer, on the battlefield. In a modern, civilized society, this meaning may be somewhat upsetting, but if the first were not so capable, we would not be here!

What other Irish names are of the Clann Fiamhain? The McDaid's are a branch. It was first, Davitt O'Dogherty. He became quite famous in battle and in administration. His children became known as McDavitt. Later anglized to McDaid, Davidson, McDavid, and others. Not all Davidsons are McDavitts, as David was a popular first name, thus it was used by other families.

Another name of Clann Fiamhain: McCaffrey. The O'Dohertys had a powerfull, well organized army, as early as the 1400's. The cavalry began to be used extensively, as roads became more open. The cavalry was the crease of the Clanns fighting force, made up of the vigorous, experienced family members. To differentiate, they began to be called, " McCaffreys" or sons of the calalrymen. Thus another branch of the O'Dohertys became a surname!

Then there is the name, 'McConnellogue'. We are attempting to research this name. That it is a branch, is a fact, but what brought about this name, we are unable to determine.

The Clann Motto

Two variations of the Clann motto are used: Ar nDuthchus, (or Ar nDutcas, with the use of Celtic pronunciation marks), the meaning of this form is, " For our inheritance".

-----The O'Donnells Rise Again-----

We pass on to the Great O'Donnell Clann, our congratulations on the promotion of a Clann Gathering in 1989. We, at O'Dochartaigh Headquarters received an invitation to attend the opening program at Ballyboffy. We were very proud to represent the O'Dochartaighs at this historical occasion. Helen Hoogendwyn-Allen was in attendance with me.

We are very close in relationship to this clann, as we share Conell Gulban as a common ancestor.

We have found out some of the spelling, 'Daugherty' also. It was recorded back in the 1500's. It is also found on the Island of Mann, in large numbers, (we understand). Must get over there to see. If a Clann member emigrated before the 1800's, his spelling is likely to be DAUGHERTY or DAUGHARTY or DAUGHTRY or DAUGHTREY. It could be reasoned that it was caused by the lazy 'O'. But I have found it in Ireland early, in the mid-millennium. So probably, both of the above ideas could be accepted.

-----Newsletter Number 20-----

Word is coming in on the late arrival of #20. It was completed early May. Printed by late May. Then we attempted to ship it by Royal Mail, as the cost was prohibitive by air. With a promise of a six week delivery date, we went thru the North. As stated in the inclosed flyer, in #20, we did not have the funds to ship any other way. This letter will be copied once and sent to Jack Doherty, Princeton, N.J., printed, then bulk mailed to people in North America. Other mailings, to Australia, S. America, Africa, the Far East, will go out by air, as they are in small numbers. It is hard to figure what way to go. Printing is cheaper in Ireland, mailing individually is costly. We printed #20 in Donegal, because of the upgrading, but suffered otherwise. With Jack Doherty in N.J., we will return to that procedure.

Historically reminiscent-On the first of January, 1440, Brian Duff O'Dogherty became Lord of Ennishowen, (Inishowen). This article is being typed, the same day but 550 years later, in the same county. The county then was called, Tyrconnell, the "Land of Connell". This causes a thought; who can prove their ancestry back to the last ruling line of, "The O'Doherty"? The last chieftain was Sir Cahir Rua O'Dogherty, who rebelled against English in 1608. On the last day of our Clann Gathering, 17, July, 1990, the "White Rod of Office" will be presented to Our Chieftain. It has been almost 400 years since Cahir Rua was handed this symbol of chieftainship. We have been leaderless since then. It is hoped that this chieftainship will carry with it certain responsibilities of management. It is hoped that this person will be in a position to take over the duties needed to advance the many aspirations of 'Clann Fiamhain'.

Do plan on taking part in the Gala occasion. Thanks to the work of Finbarr O'Dochartaigh, it is possible for this "Grand Event" to take place at the Guild Hall in Derry City. The total program will involve a Medieval Banquet, a Ceremonial Ball and the Presentation of Office.

-----Proud we are, The Dougherty/Nulty Combination-----

The Clann Archives are very proud to be in possession of the booklet, "Dougherty Family Reunion", A Gathering of the Descendants of John Dougherty and Mary Agnes Nulty. This grand event was held at St. Mary's Villa, Amber, Pa. Rosemary Dougherty Peters sent this to Headquarters. We hope to have all persons listed on the computer soon.

-----Another Campbell-----

We have another family history submitted to our archives. It is from A.G. Campbell, who spent most of his life in the Tennessee area. He has diligently traced his ancestry back to the 1600's on many of his lines. He has been a member of our assoc. since our early years. He has supported our projects in many ways. They were Doherty, O' Docherty, Daughettes, Darity, Dority, Dorrity, Daugherty, Daughtry, Daughtery, Daugharty, Dougharty, etc. Just to mention a few: Mary Patton, wife of the founder of Louisville, who, arrived on a warm July day in 1778, was a Dougherty; John Daugharty, (Doherty, Daugty), builder of Fort Nelson (1779); Cornelius Dougherty, from Inishowen (1760) to Virginia, from Virginia (1776) to Estill's Station, Kentucky. In Clann History IV, we will have several pages of this story for your inspection. Much research has been sent in by: Ruth Daugherty Browing, of Louisville, Ky.; Ruby Bogner, of Calif.; and Clarence Daugherty of Napa, Calif. Many others have sent in a wealth of history on the passage of this Clann down through the ages. We will publish what is possible. Help is certainly welcome on this project or any other.

-----Congratulations to Family Group 75-----
 We would like to comment on the progress this Family has been making since the 1950's. Five Family Gatherings from 1956 to 1989. This family is descended from William J. Doherty and Catherine Johnston, of Belfast, Co. Antrim, Ireland. William shipped out of Derry on 27 April, 1889 aboard the S.S. Grecian. His family followed later and they eventually set up house in Bowden, Alberta, Canada. Thirteen children were born of this marriage. Their descendants are now spread over the North American continent. Number six reunion will be held 15-17 July, 1994. Submitted for this issue: "St. Patrick"; and the "Marauding Irish".

St. Patrick, a Man of Many Writings

He is believed to have been a Roman-Briton. He was captured by a band of Irish raiders. It is generally accepted that the chief of these Irish marauders was Niall of the Nine Hostages, the ancestor of Clann Fiamhain, (O'Dochartaigh). Many such raids were taking place from 200 to 450 A.D.. We can perhaps reason that these Irish depredations were a major cause for the Romans to leave Britain. St. Patrick was brought as a young slave into the north of Ireland, where he was a shepherd. A few conjectures are that he was kept under Niall's servitude and became well known to Niall's sons. Sucat, (St. Patrick's original name), escaped and returned to his home country. He returned to Ireland many years later as a missionary Bishop. His main Church was at Armagh, Ulster. His story, his actions, his successes, all but vanished beneath a huge accumulation of legend.

One of his very early triumphs was the conversion of Conal Gulban. Conal was a son of Niall and was a leading power in Northwest Ulster and the Patriarch of O'Dochartaigh. This leads us to consider them possible friends in Sucat's early days.

The Marauding Irish

E. J. DOUGHERTY-The Irish entered more forcefully into history with the decline of the Roman Empire in the west. The Irish by the fourth century, engaged in large scale raids on Roman Britain. DAUGHERTY COUNTY, GEORGIA

Daugherty County, Georgia was named for Charles Daugherty, noted anti-bellum lawyer and jurist of Georgia. Leader of Georgia Bar, practiced law at Athens, Georgia, Judge of Western Circuit, Wig in politics but identified with wing of Whigs which advocated Southern rights; was noted that he had unselfish patriotism and a spotless character. The County was created December 15, 1853, from existing Baker County which had been laid out in 1825. Daugherty County is 37-1/2 miles long, 12 miles wide and earlier in the century boasted crops of cotton, corn, sugar cane, rice, tobacco, grain, fruits and vegetables. The chief city is Albany. The Flint river runs diagonally through N.E. to S.W. The creek Indians occupied the land originally. No Dougherty can be found among the early settlers.

The first recorded Mass was 1845 in the home of John Mack. It is part of the Diocese of Charlestown. Two units were fielded in the Confederate cause bearing the Daugherty name. The Daugherty Group Co. K 51st GA Infry. Many of them died at Gettysburg and the Daugherty Hussars, 1861.

CLAN HISTORY

THE FIRST O'DOGHERTY KNIGHT



Seán Mór O'Dogherty

Sir John O'Dogherty, Lord of Inishowen and Chief of the O'Dogherty clan. He agreed not to take any of the English and was knighted by James I. He was knighted by the Arthur 2d page, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, on January 2, 1611. He died 1641 and was succeeded by his son Hugh O'Dogherty, Lord of Inishowen. He was knighted on orders of King James by the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, Sir John Ker, on 12th January 17, 1611.

A few families were united in Inishowen. Others were transferred to the Royal House where O'Dogherty visited in 1611 and wrote the following:-

"The O'Dogherties are stout and chieftain like; stiff, stubborn, unyielding, much degenerated in their present state, but have all good blood; among them all, (i.e., O'Donnell, O'Doyne, MacDermott, MacDermott), the O'Doyne and the O'Dogherties are the finest house in the island."

And upon words of the O'Dogherties:-

"We, old as the counts of Levere' Shrewell, are the fools which they have and the wise, for they fall."

THE LAST O'DOGHERTY KNIGHT

Cahir O'Dogherty

Sir Cahir O'Dogherty, son of Sir John O'Dogherty was educated in London. He was knighted when 24 years old by the Earl of Brackley. His lordship of Inishowen was confiscated by a patent issued by King James, April 15, 1610. He was the leader of the O'Dogherty rebellion and was 24 years old when defeated and slain in battle.



QUEEN ELIZABETH I

From our Belfast research came the following transcript: "Inquisicio, Village of Derry, County Donegal, Ireland, in the 45th. year of the Queens reign, (about 1600)" This inquisition was brought about because several O'Doghertys' attempted to usurp the Queen, s laws in regards to fishing rights on Lough Foyle. Here are the usurpers: (All Clann) Hugh Boy McCahir of Greencastle, Shane of Glannaganell, Avergagh McShane of G'castle, Corw McDonsell, G'Castle, Neal oge McPhelim of Carrickbragly, Walter McHugh of Buncanna, Shane McWalter, Glensely, Brian McTirlagh of Malin, Federorogh McCalire of Tormona, Neal Crone of Buncrannagh, (all O'Doghertys'). At that time Derry was called an Island. The above was translated from Spanish(?).

OBITUARIES 1990

The "White Rod of Office" passes on to a younger generation. A Patriarch of Clann O'Dochartaigh, Harry, (Henry), O'Doherty, of 15 Crawford Square dies Dec. 7th, 1989.

Just 2 weeks short of his 90th. birthday, Harry passed away with his loving family at his side. With his wife, Mary Ellen Hegarty, he resided at 15 Crawford Square, Derry City. They were the parents of nine children, one of which is Finbarr, who has assisted the clann in organising the Derry aspects of the forth-coming Clann gathering.

Harry, with Mary at his side, lead an eventful life, mostly within the confines of Derry city. He was born on Fredrick St; at the close of the last century. His father was George O'Doherty and his mother of McGhane lineage. Harry followed family tradition and began in the butchering trade, (at the age of 14). The place of business was the old Butchery on Foyle Street where Harry trained many decades of apprentices. He retired in 1979, working in the trade for 65 years.

A long life lead to many accolades; in his trade, in sports and on the political sphere. He assisted in the founding of the Butchers and Allied Workers Union. He was a member of the Trade Union Congress for scores of years.

Harry was involved in the G. A. A. revival in the 1920's and attained Gold Medal status as a player in Gaelic Football. He openly and defiantly fought in the War for Independence, (1915-1924). He was decorated as a veteran in that war. He was very much opposed to the partition of the Six Counties. He has maintained life long friendship with many of the leaders in that war for independence, such as; Dan Breen, Tom Barry, the sons and daughters of James Connolly and also with Dr. Nora Connolly O'Brien. For the last year, Harry has acted as host to the many organizational meetings needed to set up the 1990 Clann Gathering. Visitors were welcomed from all over the world, in preparation for this grand event.

We of the Clann O'Dochartaigh are so very proud of this man and his accomplishments. He will be sorely missed by all who knew him. "Into the Great Archives of our Clann we place this mans achievements. They are legend already".

Memorial services for William R. "Red" Dougherty Jr., formerly of St. Louis and Poplar Bluff, will be held Sunday, October 22, 1989, at 11:30am at First Divine Science Church of St. Louis.

Mr. Dougherty retired from the Missouri Pacific Railroad in 1960. He served in the Army and the National Guard, and was a member of the American Legion, Disabled Veterans of America, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Prior to moving to Tampa, Florida, in 1967, he was a full-time volunteer at the VA Hospital in Poplar Bluff.

Mr. Dougherty is survived by his wife, Dorothy E. Dougherty; three sons and two daughters-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. William R. Dougherty III of Memphis, TN, Mr. and Mrs. Michael M. Dougherty of Tampa, FL, and Mr. Patrick V. Dougherty of Poplar Bluff; 8 grandchildren and 1 great-grandchild; his brother, Guy R. Dougherty of Santa Rosa, CA; and two sisters, Jane Merrick of St. Louis and Maurine Gaddel of Scottsdale, AZ.

ATOMIC ASSIGNMENT

Word has filtered through from the High Command that a Clann member was one of the team of scientists that developed the Atomic Bomb. He was William Doherty, who has very close ties with Ireland. We certainly would like to hear more about him.

DEATH IN THE OLD WEST

In 1896, John Doherty, Sheriff of Moro County Mexico, was shot by outlaws. He was born in Drumrooske, Co. Donegal. This ancestral home is now occupied by cousin, Jim Kelly.

Recently, a relative Sean Diver, visited the Dohertys in Colo. and New Mexico. He received a grand welcome, a full steer Bar-B-Q and demonstrations on cowboy riding by cousin, Jim Doherty.

This family of rugged pioneer stock, took more than outlaws to be stopped. A brother Joseph, carried on as sheriff, with Jim, Frank and Anthony Doherty as deputies. This family expanded into land and cattle, acquiring a 50,000 acre ranch. Dan Doherty is the present owner, manager of this spread which follows the Santa Fe Trail up to the Colorado Boarder.

Other Irish names who supported the Dohertys were the Gildes and the Curristins.

John Doherty, who was shot in 1896, was married to a Donegal lass named Bridget McGoldrick, (1894).

Re: Blood on the Shamrock

Dear Sir,

I have recently transcribed from scrap-books a series of articles I have had published since the mid-1960's. In total the present manuscript consists of some 120 pages, all of which are double-spaced and on A4 paper as requested by most publishers. Other material could be added if a publisher so wished, and at present I have included two articles written by friends with their consent.

At present, Ms. Margie Bernard, a social historian and poet who hails from Washington D.C. , has the original manuscript, and is writing 'An Overview' of the entire work. Ms. Bernard has recently had her work, 'Daughter of Derry' published by Pluto Press, London and it relates the story of Brigid Sheils Makowski, a mutual friend of ours.

Ms. Bernard has been giving me some useful advice, part of which is to present a brief biography of myself to any potential publisher. I was born at 134 Bogside, Derry in late September 1944 into a family steeped in nationalist and trade-union politics. My father was a veteran of the War of Independence and civil war, and he, like my brother Pat Leo and myself served periods of imprisonment for political activity. From my early teens I have been active on various social and economic issues, holding executive positions in such agitational groups as the Derry unemployed and housing action committees. In 1967 I was one of a handful of people who founded the N.Ireland Civil Rights Association. I was chairperson of the city's first-ever Civil Rights march on October 5th. 1968, and was arrested the following evening with Eamonn Mc Cann, who in later years published 'War and an Irish Town', and jointly charged. In the week that followed I was elected unto the Derry Citizen Action Committee and later held the position of Hon. Secretary. Fellow members included Mr. John Hume who was later to be M.P. for Foyle and currently serves as a Euro M.P. In addition Ivan Cooper, a close friend who became Minister of Community Relations, and others who were later to become nationalist mayors of the city.

My writings reflect a radical perspective on many social and economic issues of that time, but also relate to Irish affairs up until the late 80's. At present I am co-ordinating the O'Dochartaigh (O'Doherty) International Clann Re-U_nion which occurs in July 1990 and will again attract many thousands of visitors. I hope to find a publisher before that date so that the work can be promoted as part of the Clann Re-U_nion. I await with much interest your response to the details enclosed.

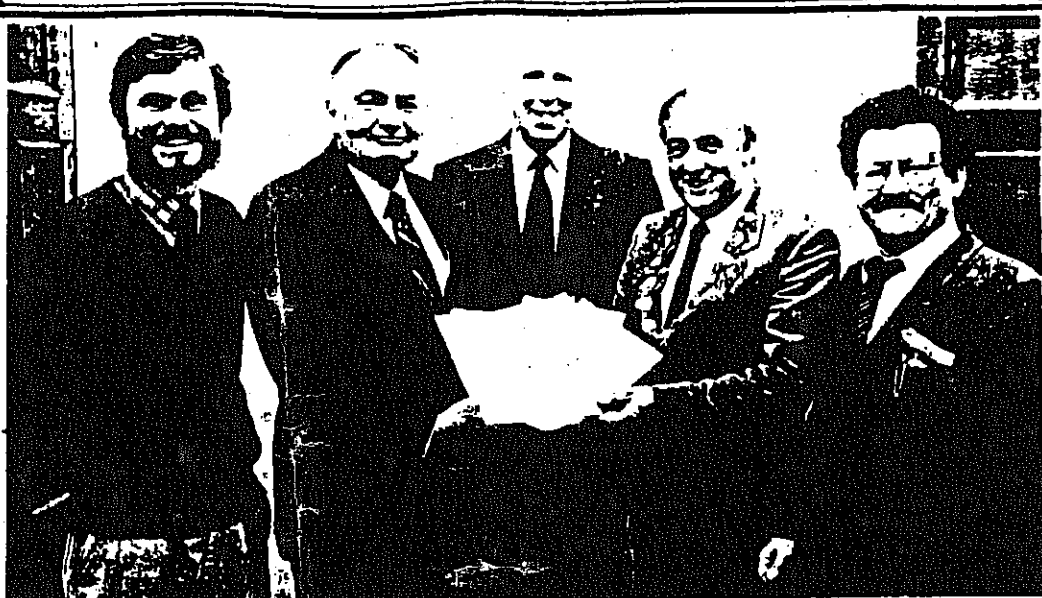

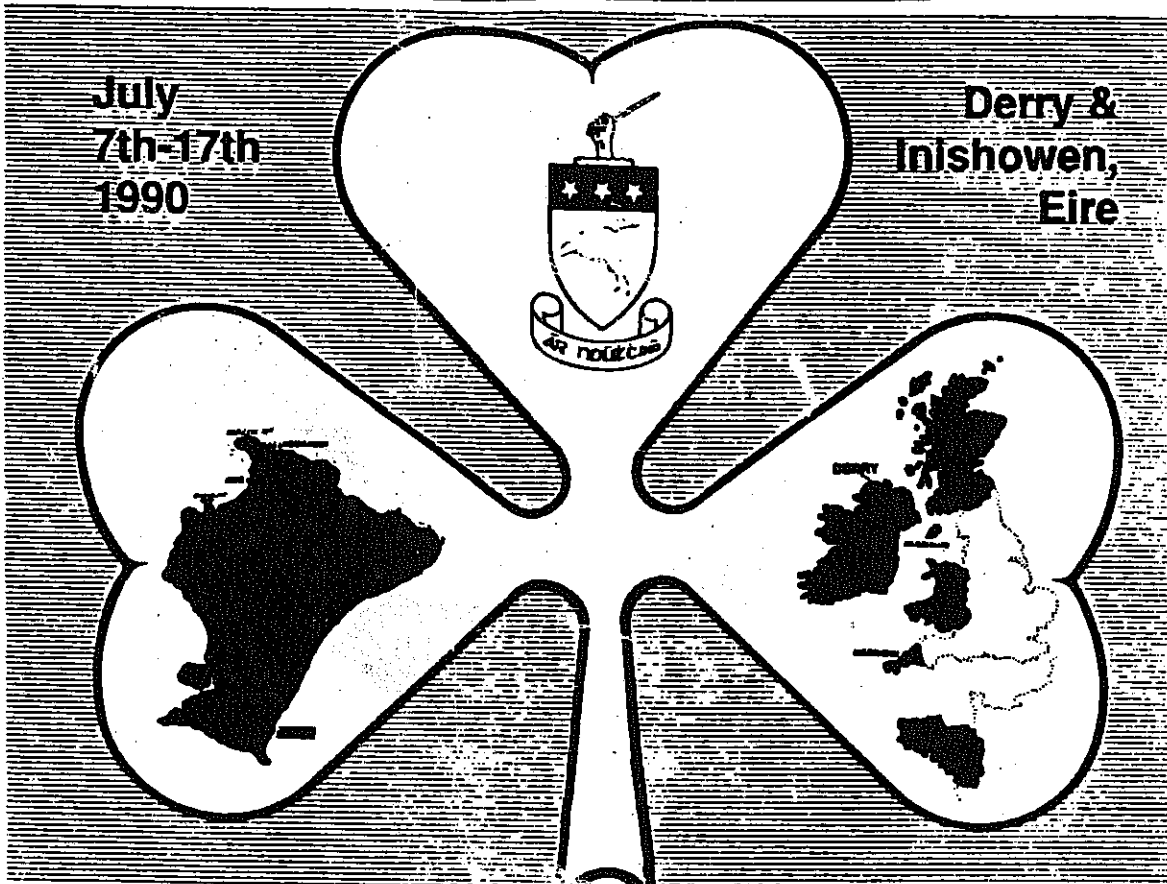
